~ Impact: Reflection of our Commitment ~

The depth of Smart Start's impact is based upon how we fulfill our commitment to our constituency. Smart Start is committed to supporting child care providers and educators and providing them with opportunities to continue learning; Smart Start is committed to supporting quality child care centers and providing access to those centers to families without access; Smart Start is committed to supporting families and providing early learning and development experiences; Smart Start is committed to improving the health of our children ages birth to five and providing access to health services. As evidence of our commitment, here are some accomplishments from 2005-2006:

Support of Providers and Educators –

- o **96 educators received scholarships to continue their education**
- o **431 educators received supplements for professional development**
- o **292 new early childhood educators enrolled in Smart Start's Technical Assistance Center**

Support of Quality Child Care –

- o **Child care subsidies and emergency child care assistance increased by \$28,170**
- o **355 children received subsidies for child care**
- o **39 children received emergency child care assistance**

Support of Families –

- o **2468 families received child care resource and referral services**
- o **85 teen mothers graduated from high school, including 13 Latina mothers**
- o **1322 parents received home visits and participated in parent education groups as a part of a Smart Start funded activity**

Support of Health and Development –

- o **4667 children received oral health assessments at 118 sites**
- o **6772 Hispanic pediatric patients at the Downtown Health Plaza received translation services**
- o **500 children were screened for developmental delays**

The greater these numbers are, the better prepared our children are when they begin kindergarten. We rely on our partners, our donors, and the community to continue to increase these numbers to ensure the success of our children, thereby ensuring the success of our community as a whole.

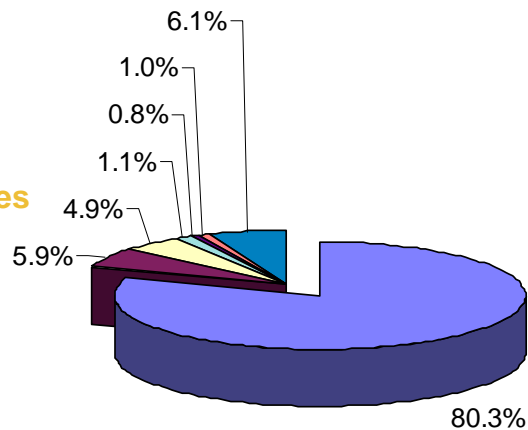
